## 8. Bird Island Current Inland MPA (Marine Protected Area)



**Proposed Marine Protected Area:** The Marine Section of Addo Elephant National Park, currently consists of the Bird Island and St. Croix Island groups. The 120 000 Cape Gannet colony on Bird Island is the largest in the world. The Bird Island group is a current MPA. A larger MPA is proposed for the protection of nesting gannets and fish populations. There are about 8 500 breeding pairs of critically endangered African penguins on St. Croix Island, the largest breeding colony in the world. The Southern Right Whale and Common Whale share these waters, comprising Addo Elephant National Park's 'Big 7'. Both of these whales are in decline and are common sight in the waters along the shores of this coastline.

Note: This Cape Island was not added to visitors due to the ecological importance of the islands. While visitors have access only through private licensed whale watching operators in Port Elizabeth and not by the Park. Arrangement operators available on request.
